A MESSAGE FROM THE FIRE DEPARTMENT

The A/Fire Chief reminds everyone that the fire hazard rating is extreme and encourages residents and visitors to exercise caution at all times. The complete burning ban continues until further notice by the Fire Chief. Observation and early reporting of fires remains important to response times and outcomes.

On a related note, while both firefighters and residents appreciate the annual Hallowe'en bonfires (hazard rating permitting), materials for those fires are not being accepted at either firehall at this time due to the management risk they present. In October, if residents wish to donate materials, they are requested to contact the Fire Chief to arrange for delivery.

New recruits continue to train alongside veteran volunteers, and on Thursday evenings residents may notice fire department members at differing locations practicing their skills. ** 2010 PROPERTY TAXES REMINDER **

This is a reminder that as of 4:00 p.m. September 1, 2010 an additional 5% penalty will be added to any outstanding 2010 property taxes. Outstanding taxes that are in arrears (1 year overdue) and delinquent (2 years overdue) will continue to accrue daily interest at a rate set by the province.

Late payments must now be made at the Municipal Office located at 1980 Millstream Road. We accept cash, cheque or debit.

TRAFFIC ADVISORIES

Millstream Road (Langford): south of Western Speedway, Monday - Friday, 6:30 a.m. - 3:00 p.m.. An upgraded water main is being installed. Lane closures are in effect as needed with traffic control directing traffic. Delays may be expected; motorists please be aware. It is anticipated that the work will continue into late September.

Finlayson Arm Road (Highlands, Langford):

Commencing August 23, entire length of road, Monday - Friday, 9 a.m-5 p.m.. A contractor for B.C. Hydro is installing new connector sleeves at each hydro pole. Expect alternating lane closures with traffic control directing traffic. Short delays are anticipated, especially along the portion of Finlayson Arm Road located in Langford. It is anticipated the this work will take two weeks to complete, (August 23 - September 3 inclusive).

SUSTAINABILITY TASK FORCE **RECOMMENDATIONS - UPDATE**

At its July meeting, Council approved Terms of Reference for a Sustainability Plan. The terms will be used to request proposals from qualified consultants to help the District create a Highlands Sustainability Plan. The process builds on the excellent work done by the Sustainability Task Force, and anticipates that the most important step will be bringing discussion into the public sphere and engaging as many residents, business people and other stakeholders as possible.

NEW REZONING APPLICATIONS

The District received two rezoning applications in July. The first proposes a conservation zone for Second Lake land on Millstream Lake Road. The second proposes the creation of 14 lots plus parkland and other amenities on a parcel which abuts Southwood Drive, Gowland Road and Rowntree Road.

REGIONAL CURBSIDE RECYCLING PROGRAM - UPDATE

At its July 19 regular meeting, Council was provided with a presentation from CRD staff members regarding planning for a future enhanced regional curbside recycling program. The current Blue Box contract expires in April 2012, and CRD staff, committees and Board members are working on shaping options for a new program. Decisions will be required for potential elements of a new program such as kitchen waste collection (definition: food waste you wouldn't put in your home composter, for those who compost, and all food waste for those that don't). Next steps will include public consultation on the numerous regional recycling options; the timeline for consultation may be as early as this fall.

EAGLES LAKE - PUBLIC CONSULTATION

At its July 19th meeting, Council received a report from the chair of the Highlands Park and Recreation Association containing



recommendations pertaining to Eagles Lake Park. The recommendations followed concerns received from a nearby property owner, and mostly focused on local parking issues, but also included the notion of expanding the beach. An accompanying staff report noted that any future mitigating regulations that might be adopted to address management of the park could be embodied in a bylaw. Other areas of concern that have come forward to date include refuse, animal control, partying and fire hazards.

Council received the report for information and voted to conduct public consultation on the matter. Council welcomes your comments, and plans to revisit these issues at its September 20th council meeting. REMINDER - HIGHLANDS IS A NO SHOOTING ZONE!

In response to incidents reported by residents over the past two months, the district would like to remind everyone that Highlands prohibits the discharge of firearms, as defined in Bylaw 145. The bylaw, adopted in 2000, makes exception for any Peace Officer, Conservation Officer, Animal Control Officer or member of the Armed Forces lawfully engaged in the execution of their duty.

Additionally, exception is made for farmers protecting their stock in an emergency. Persons discharging a firearm in accordance with the exceptions must report the discharge to the District within 24 hours.

The RCMP provides enforcement for Bylaw 145, which can be found in its entirety on the District website.

Note: The incidents referred to above did not involve wildlife.



NEW! DISTRICT LAPEL PINS

Lapel Pins are now available at the District office. In March 2010 Council approved a Lapel Pin Policy which includes the following:

- 1. Each resident of the District will be entitled to one (1) free pin.
- 2. District Pins shall be issued to members of the public at a cost of two dollars (\$2.00) each.
- 3. Proceeds from the sale of the pins shall be used to purchase replacement pins.
- 4. Groups requesting pins may be issued one "Complimentary" pin per member (up to a maximum of 20) and additional pins may be purchased by the Group at cost.
- 5. Complimentary pins may be given on a discretionary basis by officers of the municipality.

Highlands's residents are invited to drop by the district office to pick up your pin!

HIGHLANDS HISTORY - DO NOT TRY THIS AT HOME!

August of 1904 was hot and dry but that did not stop George Bernard who lived at Mitchell Lake from using fire to clear his swamp to make a meadow. Excerpts from his wife Jessie's diary:

- 11th "Very hot fire smouldering all day but suddenly burst into flames in evening, dead tree burnt and fell across road to lakes."
- 12th: "Very hot again. G. worked at fire all day."
- 14^{th:} "Sunday very hot, fires burning all round and air very smoky."
- 15th "Very hot still. G. burning at slough all day and piling brush."
- 16th "George drove to Langford station, met the 9:20 AM train and brought Mr. Bernard back with him. Bert went too, to help if trees had fallen on road as fire is raging so fiercely down there."
- 20th "Fires are burning heavily round Aldermere (where our Municipal Office now stands) and the two houses at the lime kiln are gone."

Jessie wrote of the smoke they had to deal with for the next few days, "much cooler, air very black with smoke." and "Everything smoky and air liquid again. G. piling and burning brush in swamp." Thankfully the cool and wet of the fall eventually came and put an end to the danger.

Note: It sounds as if George Bernard may have lit much of the West Highlands on fire...
